
Dave Janz, MD, MSc

Dr. Matthew W. Semler is an Assistant Professor of Medicine and Biomedical Informatics in the Division of Pulmonary, and Critical Care Medicine at Vanderbilt University. Dr. Semler is a critical care physician and Associate Director of the Medical Intensive Care Unit at Vanderbilt. Dr. Semler's research program identifies non-patient-centered variation in current clinical practice, embeds pragmatic randomized trials into clinical care to understand which treatments produce the best outcomes for which patients, and implements the results into practice. Randomized trials he has helped lead, including nine published in the *New England Journal of Medicine* or *JAMA*, have challenged longstanding dogma around common practices in fluid management, airway management, and respiratory support. Dr. Semler serves as Chair of the Steering Committee for the Pragmatic Critical Care Research Group, a co-PI of an International Coordinating Center for the NIAID STRIVE network, and Medical Director of the VICTR Center for Learning Healthcare.
