ust over a year ago a group of Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt nurses, advanced practice nurses, respiratory therapists, and child life specialists were asked to form an editorial board and step into the roles of writers, editors, and more. After Chief Nursing Officer (CNO), Gretchen McCullough, MSN, RN, NEA-BC, completed her "First 100-Day Assessment," she identified the need to offer "a place where we can celebrate, across our diverse environments of care" and with this call to action, The Thread newsletter was born. The Thread aims to keep readers connected and informed with topics like frontline innovation, achievements, and introductions to new faces. Shelly Bledsoe, MSN, RN, NE-BC, serving as Content Manager, put it perfectly saying, "we have

the honor of spotlighting the incredible work of our Monroe Carell nursing and clinical support teams whose compassion, expertise, and commitment to excellence inspire us all." Christina Echegaray, Director of Communications, added that "this publication sets a standard for how teams can strengthen communication and spotlight their achievements."

Reflecting on some of our most loved articles from the first year: Our launch issue introduced our newest facility dog, Velour, who provides animal-assisted interventions for pediatric patients. Another issue showcased Graden Knapp, Gaming and Technology Specialist, who uses gaming to build connections with patients to support healing processes. NICU's Melissa Hill, BSN, RN, CCRN, was featured for creating a process resulting in over 425 calendar days between gastrointestinal flora related Central Line Associated Bloodstream Infections. In perioperative services, Kathleen Gobbell, BSN, RN, CPN, and

Rachel Bram, BSN, RN, were highlighted for their research on decreasing temperature related events in patients with cerebral palsy.

To close, a few words from our CNO, Gretchen McCullough: "One year into our work on *The Thread*, we have created a tangible collection of some of our most powerful stories. It is my hope that this publication continues to be a way of bringing our communities together and to connect each of us to the things that matter most, healthy patients and healthy clinician communities. Daily Senior Leader Rounds Elevates Frontline Voices

reated and initiated after Chief Nursing Officer, Gretchen McCullough's "First 100-Day Assessment" at Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt, Senior Leader Rounds have become an integral part of our hospital culture and daily routines. These rounds have expanded to involve an interdisciplinary team, including members of the Nurse Administrative Board, Quality and Safety leaders, Operations leaders, and Physician partners, spending an hour in direct conversation with the people doing the work. Daily rounds allow staff to voice what is going well, highlight areas needing attention, and discuss how they can be supported in delivering safe and effective patient-and-family-centered care.

To support rounds, Gretchen, has worked diligently to bridge gaps existing between leaders and staff. She intentionally uses therapeutic silence and active listening to foster meaningful dialogue. By approaching staff as people first and clinicians second, she has shifted the culture of rounds to one of openness and shared understanding.

Gretchen emphasizes that the impact of Senior Leader Rounds on nursing practice range from practical solutions — such as repairing a broken monitor or providing additional feeding pumps — to broader changes such as increasing the number of operating rooms or restructuring staff benefits. Additionally, many quality and

safety initiatives stem directly from staff input, who identify gaps in care and safety concerns. Gretchen notes that many tactics in the nursing strategic plan are influenced by these bedside conversations, affecting staff and overall hospital operations.

A recent success story from rounds involved increasing resources for Emergency Department nurses who are caring for behavioral health patients. Nurses raised concerns about the challenges of finding and securing outpatient placements for these children and adolescents. After concerns were shared with advocacy groups at the state level, Monroe Carell received a large disbursement of funds for behavioral health resources, including discharge planners and assessment specialists, that better support nurses in the management of patient care. This is just one story highlighting the tangible benefits of daily rounds.

Senior Leaders Rounds are more than just an hour of people's time. In fact, they are the favorite part of Gretchen's day because of the chance to connect with nurses at the bedside. These daily conversations create room to make meaningful changes in the lives of those we serve while attending to the needs of the ones we serve alongside.

Leveling Up Leaders

Mentor Tabletop Sessions

o grow the nursing profession, organizations must empower nurses to develop as leaders. At Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt, Chief Nursing Officer, Gretchen McCullough, MSN, RN, NEA-BC, embraced transformational leadership during her "First 100-Day Assessment" by conducting interviews to identify opportunities for improvement. Gaps were found in leader work-life balance, mentoring relationships, and understanding organizational processes.

To address these cultural challenges, a group of nurse leaders came together to brainstorm solutions which led to the Leader Mentor Tabletops, quarterly leadership development sessions sponsored by the Nursing Leadership Board (NLB). Designed by leaders for leaders, the initial 2024 sessions focused on work-life balance, networking, and professional growth.

As a Leader Mentor Tabletop advisory member, Ashley Ried, MMHC, BSN, RN, CPPS, NE-BC, noted, "knowing that I had a small part in developing the Mentor Table sessions has brought me great joy as I watch nurse leaders from across Monroe Carell engage with each other while promoting their own professional practice."

Leader Mentor Tabletop program leader Laura Parks, MSN, NI-BC, NPD-BC, stated, "the overall goal for the program is to increase connection and mentorship among leaders. I am happy to say we were able to meet that goal, seeing an increase of selfreported mentoring relationships from 36% to 70% (n=47) and an increase in our Leader Engagement composite score from 3.85 in 2022 to 4.0 in 2025."

In 2025, sessions focused on productivity, fostering growth and development in staff, review of the apparent cause analysis process, and hospital finance, each paired with a book club experience to deepen connections. These initiatives highlight how mentorship and support can transform health care cultures, helping leaders overcome challenges and create meaningful change.

Step-by-Step: The Tiered Skills Orientation Model

rientation to a new department and role — especially for a newly graduated nurse — can feel like a daunting expedition. Learning technical and soft skills while developing the nursing "brain" can quickly overwhelm even the most confident individuals.

With this in mind, nursing education specialist Brandi Meacham, MSN, RN, CPN, and the Nursing Education Team within Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt launched an innovative pilot program in February 2023: the Tiered Skills Orientation Model. Following positive feedback from the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) and the Pediatric Surgical, Trauma, and Adolescent Medicine Unit (PSTAM), the model was expanded across the organization. Most recently, the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) and pediatric perioperative services completed implementation.

The Tiered Skills Orientation Model breaks onboarding into distinct tiers, each with specific goals and objectives that build on one another. This framework streamlines the process and creates a more intentional experience for both orientee and preceptor. Nurses with prior experience may progress more quickly by demonstrating competency in previously mastered knowledge and skills.

Shianne Behrens, BSN, RN — a former Summer 2024 Extern and now a nurse resident — shared that orientation has been a "positive experience" under the model. Despite her prior experience, she said she never found the tiers redundant and appreciated the review of basic nursing skills in Tier 1. The clear structure also helped both her and her preceptor identify her baseline at the start of each shift.

Overall, this user-friendly model reduces cognitive overload for new hires regardless of their previous experience through its structured approach. It supports early identification of knowledge gaps and provides clear benchmarks for progress, benefiting orientees and preceptors. As the Tiered Skills Orientation Model continues

to expand, it not only eases the transition for new health care professionals but also strengthens the quality of care delivered across the organization.

Pre-op Calls: Turning Surgery Stress into Success

he Holding Room (HR) and Post-Anesthesia Care Unit (PACU) play an important role in ensuring our pediatric patients are safe on the day of surgery. In January 2024, Kim Isenberg, MSN, APRN, CPNP-PC/AC, NE-BC, Advanced Practice Manager, LeighAnn Chadwell, MSN, RN, NE-BC, Associate Nursing Officer of Pediatric Surgical Services, and Katie Kaicles, BSN, RN, CPN, a Registered Nurse 4 in perioperative services, created a task force to develop a strategy to address significant gaps in pre-operative surgery information given to families that were contributing to a 6% to 15% rate of same day cancellation across all specialties. Identifying an opportunity for improvement, a process for perioperative pre-surgery calls was created.

This process enables a dedicated HR/PACU nurse to make phone calls one week prior to a patient's scheduled surgery. During this call, the nurse reviews arrival times, eating/drinking guidelines, medication records, recent illnesses, custody

agreements, and answers any questions the family has prior to the day of surgery. The Preoperative Assessment and Teaching for Children's Hospital (PATCH) advanced practice providers are available to provide support to the nurses making the phone

Kim presented this pilot at The Health Management Academy's Nursing Manager Idea Labs program in Washington, D.C., in March 2024. She then presented this project to hospital leadership where it was received with overwhelming support. Meg Rush, MD, MMHC, President, and Gretchen McCullough, MSN, RN, NEA-BC, Chief Nursing Officer, approved a nursing full-time equivalent (FTE) position dedicated to perioperative phone calls Monday-Friday.

In May 2024, Urology was the first specialty to go live using this new process. Same day cancellations for Urology decreased from 13% to 6% in eight weeks. Since then, Plastic Surgery has also gone live. The goal is to provide all specialties with this service. There are currently 11

HR/PACU nurses trained to perform phone calls with plans to train more as this service is expanded.

VPARE: Climbing the Ladder, Reimagined

dvancing up the clinical ladder as a registered nurse (RN) working at the bedside is a goal many RNs strive to achieve. However, many nurses at Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt found the process for clinical advancement to be overwhelming due to a complicated application process and a large amount of required writing. A redesign of the advancement program started in 2022 with a literature search to identify best practices. In 2024, the newly named Vanderbilt Professional Advancement and Recognition of Excellence (VPARE) program launched, mirroring the American Nurses Credentialing Center's Magnet Model framework, implementing specialty-specific internal mentorship, enabling multiple ways to submit evidence, and guaranteeing application reviews are completed by nurses who share clinical backgrounds with the applicants.

Highlights of the new design include one reflective narrative that can be submitted in various formats including written, voice-over presentation, or video. This personal narrative encourages applications to reflect on how their contributions impact their team, enhance their professional growth, and improve the professional practice of nursing. The new program also enables nurses to use

one project across multiple standards, highlighting the continuum of professional activities involved in practice change.


Monroe Carell nurses share that having a direct mentor with experience in their clinical background makes advancing easier and less intimidating. The mentors guide applicants in matching their work to the VPARE standards and in utilizing the new application submission platform. In combination, these changes have made the application process easier while still maintaining the rigor of the program. This is evident in the increased number of nurses who have moved up the clinical ladder.

As a result of the change to the VPARE model, VPARE advanced RNs in Monroe Carell have increased from 16.39% (FY23) to 23.38% (FY25), representing 217 RN3s and 60 RN4s. These statistics, combined with clinical nurse mentor and mentee feedback, demonstrate the clinical ladder optimization was successful. We are excited to see more nurses advance their professional practice in the years to come!

Expansion of Pediatric Transplantation with Landmark Dual Transplant

onroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt has expanded its solid organ transplant program to include pancreas and lung transplants. This milestone builds on its history of innovation in pediatric transplants, including Tennessee's first heart-kidney transplant (2016), heart-liver transplant (2017), and living donor liver transplant (2024).

On May 2, Jordyn Williams, 15, became the first patient at Monroe Carell to receive a dual liver-pancreas transplant. Born with cystic fi brosis, Jordyn faced years of complications, including diabetes, thyroid cancer, and severe liver dysfunction. The lifesaving procedure marked a turning point in her journey, eliminating the need for insulin and pancreatic enzymes.

Many of these patients are cared for both before and after transplant on the Pediatric Trauma, Surgery, and Adolescent Medicine Unit (PSTAM), forming meaningful relationships with patients and their families. The nursing team requires annual specialized training that is heavily based on the latest evidence to care for these complex patients. Additionally, nurses are invited to participate in the weekly Liver Selection Meeting where upcoming and post-transplant patients are discussed. The nurses are valued members of the team working alongside attending physicians and the new Hepatology APP team.

Jordyn was cared for by PSTAM nurses on the 8th floor after her transplant. Amanda Fry, BSN, RN, CPN, a PSTAM nurse shared, "It was a huge honor to take care of the first liver-pancreas transplant patient. I think it challenged us to work together as a team to provide the highest level of care possible." We are thankful for this dedicated team of nurses committed to our transplant patients.

Improving Physical Abuse Screening for Kids Across Tennessee

Recognizing the need for a standard clinical practice for emergency department screening of pediatric physical abuse, Amber Greeno, MSN, APRN, CPNP-AC, CPN, NE-BC, TCRN, director, Pediatric Trauma and Injury Prevention, got to work. Amber collaborated with representatives from each of the Comprehensive Regional Pediatric Centers (CRPC) across Tennessee to develop a standardized screening tool that would help any level hospital to identify risk factors and provide suggestions for tests and imaging based on patient age and type of injury. "Identifying abuse early can significantly improve a child's outcome; however, if it goes unnoticed, situations often worsen," she explains.

Because early detection of physical abuse is so important, the CRPC work-

group also developed a roadmap resource specifically for non-pediatric hospitals. Amber shares, "It is troubling when we receive critical children from outside facilities where health care providers failed to recognize that these children were victims of physical abuse, some having visited the hospital multiple times for symptoms associated with physical abuse, yet the signs were missed." Non-pediatric hospitals across the state welcomed the new pediatric physical abuse screening tool and roadmap with open arms.



Nurse-Led Quality Improvement Team Wins VUMC Awards

ollowing a patient harm event involving a serious peripheral IV infiltration, Vascular Access Team members Wes Mangrum-Smith, MHA, BSN, RN, Jessie Gurman, BSN, RN, VA-BC, and Sarah Watson, BSN, RN, along with Amanda Mock, MSN, RNC-NIC, EBP-C, CPPS, Manager of Nursing Quality, jumped into action. "We are a passionate group of nurses dedicated to vascular preservation and patient safety," said Sarah. The team identified early detection and prompt administration of the antidote hyaluronidase as key factors in reducing serious Peripheral IV infiltrations and Extravasations (PIVIEs), making these the focus of their improvement efforts.

To support early assessment, the team developed a PIVIE Champion training program, recruiting volunteers from every unit to assess and treat PIVIEs. As a result, the number of frontline staff trained to assess PIVIEs increased from 12

to 87, increasing the percentage of PIVIEs assessed by an expert from 45% to 81%. By partnering with Pharmacy to improve access to hyaluronidase, the treatment time for PIVIEs decreased from 94 to 59 minutes. Jessie shared that, "Improving the efficiency in helping our patients is what made this project special to me." Due to these efforts, the average number of days between serious PIVIEs increased from 44 to over 750 — and counting. Over the past two years, 17 serious IV infiltrations have been prevented!

This team's work was presented at the VUMC Pursuit of Excellence Award Poster Session, winning first place for Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt and the overall award for Vanderbilt University Medical Center. It was also featured in May 2024 at the Solutions for Patient Safety Conference and at the 2023 Tennessee Nurse's Association Annual Conference. Reflecting on the experience, Wes said, "It reminded me that bedside

nurses really can have a broader impact on patient outcomes through quality improvement and evidence-based practice initiatives."

Safety Starts with Us: Making Safety Personal at Every Level

anderbilt Health's multi-year journey to becoming a High Reliability Organization, known as Making Safety Personal, launched in March 2021, and is now in Phase 3. The Making Safety Personal journey aims to prevent adverse events from happening to our patients and staff by implementing Universal Safety and Reliability Skills. Currently, over 83% of the roughly 3,500 Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt staff members enrolled have completed "We Speak Up for Safety," and "We are Personally Committed to Safety," the first two modules in the series. The third and final module in the Making Safety Personal series, "We are Accountable to Communicate Clearly and Completely," was assigned on September 2, 2025.

As part of the Making Safety Personal initiative, all leaders attended Safety Bootcamps where they were provided Universal Safety and Reliability Skills to implement with their teams, such as starting every meeting with a safety message and high reliability rounding on staff.

The next part of our journey will be the implementation of the Safety Coach Program, and we are so thankful to have our Chief Nursing Officer, Gretchen McCullough, MSN, RN, NEA-BC, serve as the Executive Sponsor. Safety Coaches are frontline departmental

Launched on May 9, 2024, Pediatric Nursing Grand Rounds at Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt has become a dynamic platform for advancing pediatric nursing knowledge and leadership. Posters with Purpose: 2025 Poster Gallery Highlights

n the past, nursing poster galleries were hosted by the health care system in Light Hall, making it difficult for many Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt nurses to attend, especially those working night shifts, off-campus, or providing direct patient care. 

"Paws" for Progress

Research Study Demonstrates
Positive Impact of Facility Dog
Intervention

When nursing leader Michelle Robertson, MSN, RN, CNML, connected with Leslie Grissim, MA, CCLS, handler for Squid, facility dog at Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt, her idea was small: trialing a once-a-week pilot program serving pediatric cardiology clinic patients undergoing Echo and EKG procedures. It wasn't long before everyone recognized the potential for this program to turn into something much larger! Partnering with Senior Director of Nursing Professional Practice Patti Runyan, DNP, MBA, RN, NEA-BC, EBP-C, and her colleague, Jessika Boles, PhD, CCLS, the team designed a quasi-experimental research study assessing the relationship between young children's anxiety and facility dog intervention during non-sedated Echo and EKG procedures. Nurses Spencer Shreeve, BSN, RN, Briana Jeffries, BSN, RN, CPN, and Mel Firebaugh, BSN, RN, took active roles in participant recruitment and data collection for this study.

Interestingly, their research showed a statistically significant relationship between facility dog intervention and decreased anxiety in young children during ECHO and EKG — even in children with a history of multiple prior procedures. On September 13, 2024, Leslie and Spencer presented these results at the Cardiac Neurodevelopmental Outcomes Collaborative in St. Louis, Missouri.

Improving Workflow and Patient Access through AI in the Pediatric Infusion Clinic

ong wait times, limited slots, overburdened nurses, and a waiting room full of patients — a clinic's worst nightmare! This was the reality for the Pediatric Infusion Clinic, 6th floor, Doctors' Office Tower (DOT 6) in Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt. Despite utilizing high-quality acuity tools, charge nurses were spending hours trying to make equitable patient assignments, only to find assignments remained unbalanced and required several adjustments and re-assignments throughout the day. Clinic nurses brought this problem to Nurse Manager, Ashley Frost, MSN, RN, CPN, and Assistant Nurse Manager, Holly Tyler, BSN, RN. There had to be a better way — enter Artificial Intelligence (AI).

Ashley and Holly attended a webinar hosted by LeanTaas, a software company specializing in health care capacity management. The webinar highlighted a new feature for a product the clinic was already using for scheduling called iQueue. The new feature leverages AI to make patient assignments in real time. After the webinar, the leadership team contacted LeanTaas and became one of three pilot sites for this AI tool. The leadership team partnered with LeanTaas to customize the iQueue feature to support the clinic's unique needs during the pilot.

Using a similar acuity tool as before, the charge nurse assigns

an acuity level to each patient. As a patient arrives, the system utilizes AI to analyze their assigned acuity, as well as the times since the last patients were taken to identify four nurses with available capacity. The charge nurse selects the nurse to be assigned, and the process continues for each patient. Prior to this change, infusion nurses could have "boluses" of preassigned patients check-in over a short amount of time resulting in the nurse having to start multiple patients simultaneously. With this new feature, patient assignments are evenly spaced in such a way that allows each nurse to start one patient at a time, providing the patient and family with undivided attention.

Over six months, the clinic saw a 22% decrease in time from check-in to first medication as well as the ability to increase scheduling by adding 19 slots per week, a 9% increase. In addition to increasing patient throughput and access, Ashley and Holly saw a significant increase in staff satisfaction with the equity of assignments and perception of flow after only a couple months. "It's made such a dramatic impact because it basically changed the way we do everything!" said Ashley of the program.


