Seat must meet Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards and be used according to child safety restraint system or vehicle manufacturer's instructions

According to the <u>American Academy of Pediatrics</u>, all infants and toddlers should ride in a rear-facing as long as possible, until they reach the highest weight or height allowed by their manufacturer. All children who have outgrown the rear-facing weight or height limit should use a front forward facing car seat with a harness for as long as possible, up to the highest weight or height allowed by the

manufacturer.
