GEORGE A. WILLIAMS, M.D. is Chair, Department of Ophthalmology, Director of the Beaumont Eye Institute and Vice Chief of Surgical Services for Academic Affairs at William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak, Michigan. He is also Professor and Chair of Ophthalmology, Oakland University William Beaumont School of Medicine.

A graduate of Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine, he completed his residency in ophthalmology and his fellowship in vitreoretinal surgery at the Eye Institute of the Medical College of Wisconsin, where he was an associate professor until 1988.

Dr. Williams has published over 200 articles and book chapters in the field of vitreoretinal surgery. He has participated as principal investigator or co-investigator in over 20 clinical trials sponsored by the National Eye Institute and industry, and he served on the Board of Trustees of the American Academy of Ophthalmology from 2008 to 2012. He is an elected Fellow of the Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology.

He is a recipient of the Special Recognition Award, the Secretariat Award and the Lifetime Achievement Award of the American Academy of Ophthalmology. He has delivered 15 named lectureships including the 2013 Gertrude Pyron Lecture at the American Society of Retina Specialists and the 2014 YasuoTano, M.D. Lecture at the Club Jules Gonin.
