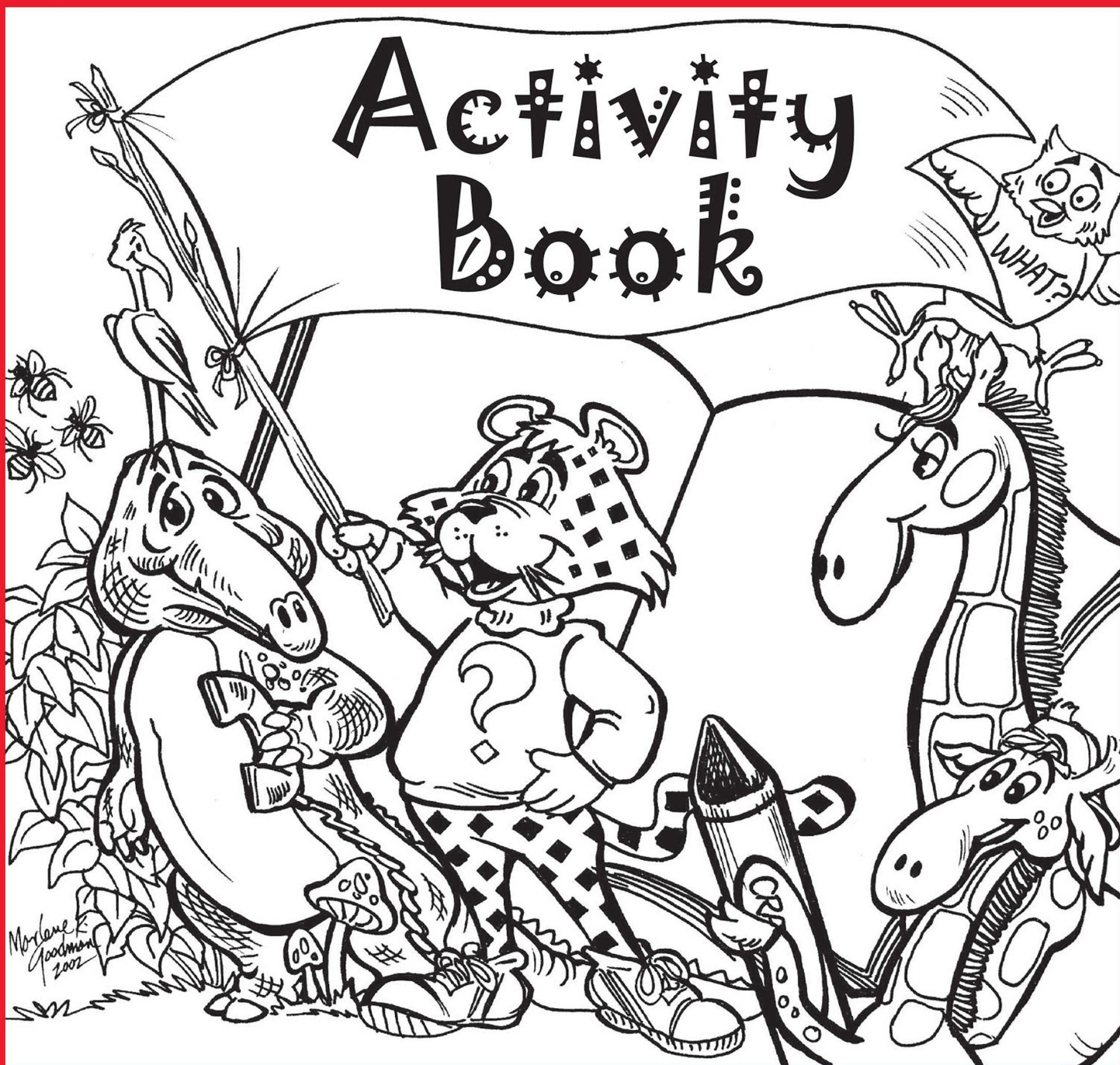

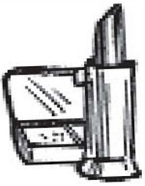
Remember, always ask first.

Poisons Come in Many Forms

Poisons can be found in many shapes, sizes and colors, and that can make it hard to tell if something is a poison. A poison can get into your body and make you sick in several ways. It can make you sick if you touch it, taste it, drink it, breath it, smell it or get sprayed by it.

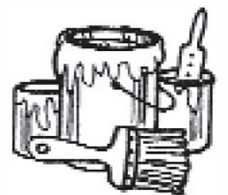

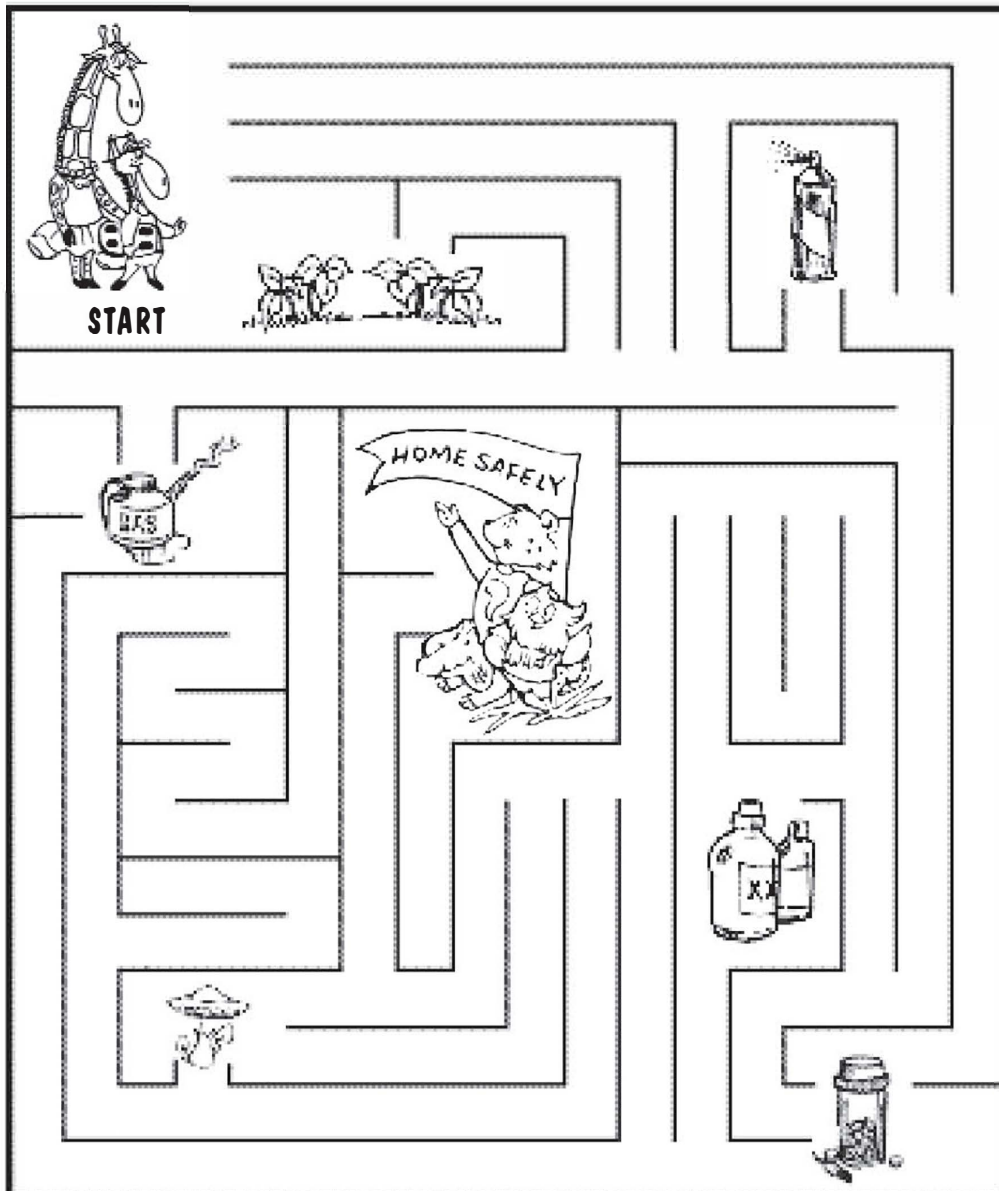

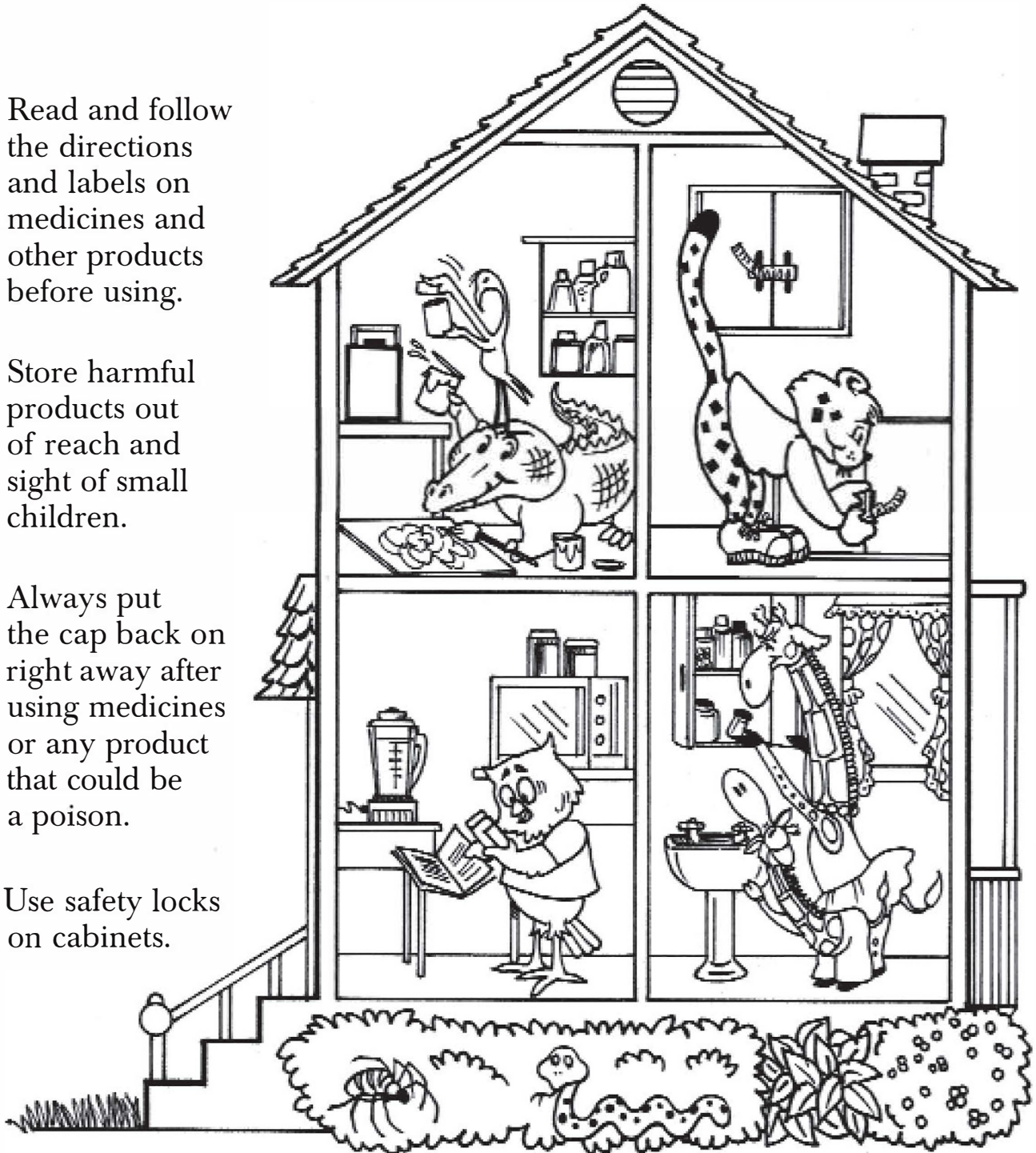

Home Safety

Poisons are found in almost every room of our homes. Grown-ups use many products to clean the house. These products are safe as long as they are used in the right way. They become poisons when they are used the wrong way and get into someone's body. That is why it is very important to make sure your home is safe from poisons.

1. Read and follow the directions and labels on medicines and other products before using.
2. Store harmful products out of reach and sight of small children.
3. Always put the cap back on right away after using medicines or any product that could be a poison.
4. Use safety locks on cabinets.

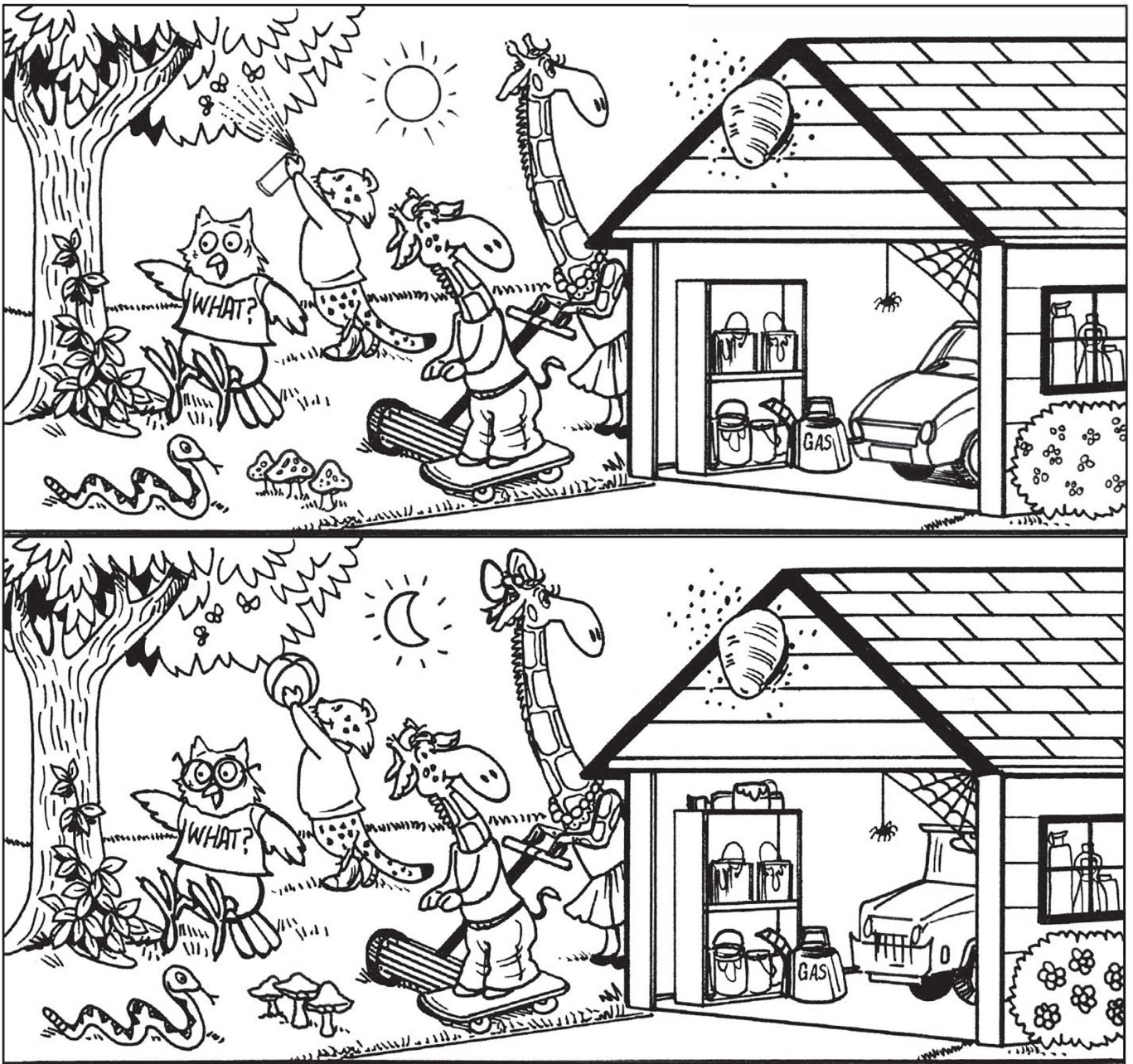

Poisons Outdoors

There are many things stored in a garage or outside that you should never touch! Adults, all products should be kept in their original containers with their original labels. Kids, you should stay away from all of these products, including gas, oil, antifreeze, lighter fluid, paint and bug spray.

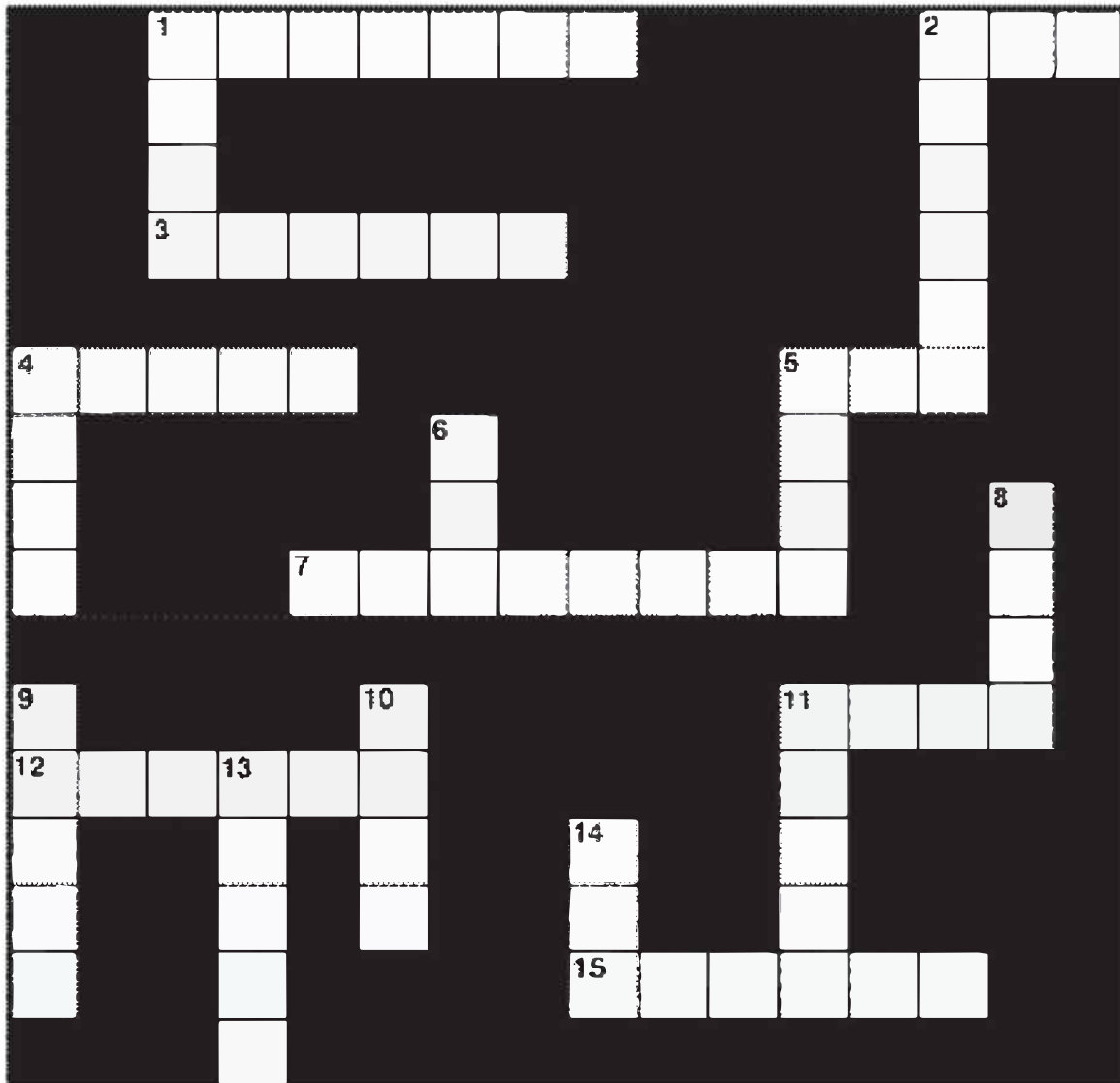
Calling for Help

Protect Your Family From Poisons!

Poison prevention and education is a job for the entire family. Inside this activity book you'll find fun educational games, along with safety tips on how to be "poison smart." We encourage you to make this activity book an active learning process for the whole family. Below are several tips on poison prevention. Your poison center encourages your family to take the necessary steps to help make your home safer from poisons.

There is one nationwide, toll-free poison center number, 1-800-222-1222, that will automatically connect you with your designated local poison center, from anywhere in the U. S. All calls will be routed to your poison center. **If you suspect a poisoning, don't wait for symptoms to appear - call 1-800-222-1222 immediately.**

Did You Know?

Anyone can call the poison center toll-free, 24 hours a day, for free, confidential advice on questions related to household products, food poisoning, bites, stings, medicine interactions, overdoses, alcohol or drug misuse, inhaling gases or fumes (intentionally or accidentally), exposure to insecticides, hazardous material incidents and more.

Poisoning is one of the leading causes of health emergencies for children in the United States. In fact, 53 percent of poisoning cases reported to poison centers involve children under the age of 6. Everyday items - such as household cleaners, pain medicines, and health and beauty products - are the most common sources of poisonings. Nearly four out of five poisoning cases can be safely treated over the phone with assistance from local poison control experts, avoiding a visit to the hospital emergency department or a doctor's office.

How Safe Is Your Home?

Poisons are found all around us - in our homes, garages, backyards and purses. Most poisonings are accidental and can be prevented. Follow these poison prevention tips to make your home a safer place:

- Make sure all potential poisons are properly stored up high and out of the reach of small children.
- Use child-resistant safety locks on cabinets.
- Keep medicines and household products in their original containers with original labels.
- Always read labels before using medicine, cleaners and other products.
