The Arc Tennessee Center for Decision-Making Support (tndecisionmaking.org)

- **Supported decision-making** the idea that a person has the right to make decisions to the full extent of their capacity, even as they get needed support
- Site provides descriptions of different decision-making supports available at every level of support
- Decision-making supports actual forms, legal documents, or formal agreements to help someone make decisions about their life

#### LifeCourse Nexus (lifecoursetools.com)

- One of the best ways to start exploring areas of life where people make decisions
- Can help individuals and families organize ideas, vision, and goals
- Individuals, parents, siblings, family members, friends are able to share ideas, hopes, and fears for the future
- Developed by the Charting the Lifecourse Nexus at the University of Missouri UCEDD

#### An Example of Questions from the Life Domain Vision Tool

- What do I think my family member will do during the day in their adult life? What kind of job or career might they want?
- Where and with whom do I think my family member will live in their adult life?
- How will they live a healthy lifestyle and manage health care supports in their adult life?
- How will my family member be safe from financial, emotional, physical or sexual harm in their adult life?

#### An Example of Questions from the Mapping Relationships Tool

- Shares Love, Affection and Trust Who serves in this role now? Looking ahead? Next Steps?
- Spends Time and Creates Memories Together Who serves in this role now? Looking ahead? Next Steps?
- Knows About Personal Interests, Traditions, Cultures Who serves in this role now? Looking ahead? Next Steps?

#### National Task Group on IDD (the-ntg.org)

- NTG is an organization working to ensure that interests of adults with IDD affected by dementia – as well as their families and friends – are taken into account
- Website offers resources, webinars, trainings, publications
- In 2024 offering free ECHO on dementia and free webinar series for family caregivers
- Developed Early Detection and Screen for Dementia (NTG-EDSD)

- Independent living—typical way anyone finds a home/apartment
- Housing Choice Voucher
  - very limited, must find landlord willing to take voucher
  - -huge waiting lists
  - -income limits vary county to county
  - may have a two-day window to get on the list: <u>https://thda.org/help-for-renters-section-8/housing-choice-voucher-program</u>

- Public Housing—limited, long waiting lists: <u>https://www.hud.gov/sites/dfiles/PIH/documents/PHA\_</u> <u>Contact\_Report\_TN.pdf</u>
- Inclusive Housing—very rare, long waiting lists

- Segregated Housing—limited, private pay only –BrightStone in Franklin

- Supported Living/Community Living Supports
  - Must be in waiver services
  - Some agencies have homes, but often individuals need to find a place they can afford to rent or buy; some inherit a home
  - Generally, 2-3 individuals in a home or apartment
  - Some agencies use the "Family Model," which offers an adult foster care type of arrangement

- Intermediate Care Facilities/Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities—very limited
  - ICFs/IID provide active treatment through intensive specialized supports and services
  - Many who live in ICFs/IID have come out of large state institutions and have complex needs that require a more intensive level of support
  - There are two categories of ICFs/IID in Tennessee: public and private.
