
### Occupational Health Update

Effective September 1, 2025, all faculty/staff required to have a yearly TB test will transition to yearly BLOOD test instead of the SKIN test that has been the standard.

#### **Benefits of blood test (Interferon-Gamma Release Assay)**

- Requires only <u>one</u> visit to Occ. Health
- Does not cause booster phenomenon
- Not subject to biases and error associated with TB skin test placement and reading
- IGRA is more sensitive than the TB skin test
- Results can be available within 24 hours
- Unaffected by the <u>bacille Calmette-Guérin (BCG)</u> TB vaccine and most nontuberculosis mycobacteria





- The authority of ACUP Leadership extends to all animals housed under the VUMC animal care and use program
- Includes animals
  - maintained in Vanderbilt
     University (VU) owned buildings
  - housed in investigator-managed satellite housing facilities







- Plan is reviewed and updated annually
- Key response personnel receive annual training
- Plans are located
  - in red binders present at all facility entrances,
     ACUP Main Office, OAWA office and TPSR
  - on ACUP website
- All researchers should have emergency plans specific to your laboratories, procedures, and staff
- Cryopreservation of valuable mouse lines is <u>strongly</u> recommended to avoid disruption or loss of research following an emergency

## Cryopreservation


# Benefits of mouse line cryopreservation & rederivation:

- Save money and time with lines that are not in use
- Limit genetic drift or loss of phenotype
- Protect valuable lines against disaster
- Import and export
- Rederived animals do not require quarantine
- 3Rs: Reduce, refine, replace








### Reporting Animal Welfare & Compliance Concerns

If you find Immediate Animal Welfare Concerns or Equipment Issues...

Call Veterinarian or Facility Manager (on call team after hours/weekends)

#### **Examples:**

- Unattended animals in procedure rooms, hallways, etc.
- Sick or injured animals
- Malfunctioning equipment or lack of supplies

Contact DAC Veterinarians if you experience any unanticipated adverse consequences resulting in animal welfare concerns or death.




Lab Animal Medicine Residency Program Overview



### LAM Residency Program


- Laboratory animal medicine residency program recognized by the American College of Laboratory Animal Medicine (ACLAM)

  - Research Project




